Letter from the SAAGH President



On behalf of your Shell Alumni Association of Greater Houston (SAAGH) Board we sincerely hope you enjoyed a happy and safe 2022 after maneuvering through the challenges that continued. It now appears that the issues we faced during the last couple of years have eased on many fronts and we wish all Shell Alumni members a much happier and healthier 2023.

When I wrote this message last year, Shell Plc ADR shares were trading at just over \$53. Shell's plan to rename and relocate headquarters has been in effect for almost a year and today, Shell Plc continues as a British publicly traded multinational oil and gas company headquartered at Shell Centre in London, United Kingdom. As I write this, NYSE: Shell shares are trading at just under \$57. The price of auto gas has also been more stable this past year with the current average price of a gallon of Regular here in Houston holding at \$2.71 with the national average a bit above \$3.20. California still leads the continental U.S. at \$4.37. The Energy Information Administration says the national average is expected to be about \$3.50 a gallon in 2023 as refineries continue to ramp up production of gasoline after the COVID shutdowns.

While the Greater Houston Area dealt with its typical share of challenges including flooding, heat, humidity, and mosquitoes we did enjoy a very calm hurricane season here. But the coronavirus pandemic continues to affect many aspects of our lives and it has changed, maybe permanently, the way we live, work, travel, shop and interact (we are still donning masks at medical facilities—I don't even know what some of my physicians look like!). And the in-office versus work remotely dynamic continues to evolve and is fascinating to watch. Businesses still struggle with scattered workforces, and they are now dealing with a very active flu season which includes new COVID variants, the influenza virus and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), all highly contagious respiratory infections. I have read that it is possible for a person to be infected with multiple viruses at the same time.

With respect to SAAGH, as I reflect on SAAGH's COVID driven challenges over the past couple of years which included the cancellation and modification of some of our favorite events all over the Greater Houston area, I can again report that your hard working SAAGH Board was able to deliver outings and events with safety protocols together with alternatives to some social gatherings via ZOOM and similar technologies, and provide you with webcasts on matters of interest to retirees.

And let me assure you that your Board and its Events Committee continue the search for relevant and safe activities for 2023. You can again expect our always popular events such as the Spring Luncheon meeting, annual BBQ, Cooking Classes, Field Trips, Theater, Baseball Games, and volunteer opportunities. And we continue to look for new and exciting ways to bring
