






Components of Metro Houston Population Change (000s)





HOUSING COST COMPARISON








Houston Single-Family Median Home Price


12-Month Moving Average






In the top two areas in which your firm is active, what WTI oil price does your firm need to profitably drill a new well?

Spot Price, West Texas Intermediate




U.S. Oil Production v. Houston Energy Jobs






Metro Houston Employment*


Available Office Space (Direct + Sublet)


Average Price, New Vehicle Sold, Houston Market*

% Probability of a Recession in the Next 12 Months




